
## Arleen Lambert Florida Family Child Care Home Association

## **Top Challenges**

The mindset that many family child care home educators hold about their roles. Too often, home-based providers do not see themselves as advocates. When moments arise that require us to step forward, use our voices, and represent our interests, many educators instinctively step back, expecting agencies or outside representatives to speak on their behalf. -This stems from a lack of recognition of their identity as business owners. The early childhood sector is heavily focused on the educational and caregiving components. However, business, financial management, marketing, leadership, and advocacy are often overlooked.
