What is Home-base Child Care

Home-based family child care, also known as home-based child care, group home care, or family friend and neighbor care, is a form of child care offered within a provider's home. These programs are independently owned small businesses that typically care for 6-10 children with one educator serving a mixed age group. In some states, these programs can accommodate up to 12-14 children with multiple staff members.

Benefit to Family Child Care Programs

- Personalized and Home-Like Environment
- Comfort and Security: Children thrive in a home-like setting that fosters a sense of comfort and security.
- Personalized Attention: Small group sizes ensure that each child receives individualized care and attention, fostering strong relationships between children and caregivers.
- Affordability and Accessibility
- Affordable Care for Families: Ensure child care is
- available across income levels and communities.
- Stabilize Providers and Programs: Keep small businesses open, ensuring families and local workforces are supported.
- Economic Development: Fully enroll child care programs to make them financially sustainable and help parents find child care openings.
- Compensation for Providers: Improve compensation for those providing critical early education and care.

The ARPA Funding Cliff

If the ARPA funding shortfall isn't addressed: Small child care businesses may close.

- Parents might leave the workforce or take drastic measures, like asking teenage children to skip school to provide care.
- This leads to cascading negative effects on families, education, and the broader workforce.
- Cost-Effective: Often more affordable than center-based care, making quality Child Care Development Block Grant (CCDBG) child care accessible to a wider range of families.
