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Supports for Family Child Care in Harris County

Project Summary - May 2025

Background

In 2024, the National Association for Family Child Care (NAFCC) received a grant from the Powell Foundation to explore opportunities to serve home-based family child care (FCC) educators in Harris County. They partnered with Channel Change to understand the landscape of supports, its strengths, existing gaps, common supports sought, and how NAFCC might support educators.

What We Did

To answer these questions, the project engaged agencies in the early childhood education sector and FCC educators in Harris County through the following activities:

- 1. Conducting a Landscape Scan
- 2. Organizing Community Advisors
- 3. Fielding an Educator Survey
- 4. Hosting a Project Workshop
- 5. Reporting to Project **Participants**

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What We Learned

Landscape of Supports



The landscape scan identified 42 capacity building supports available to FCCs. 88% of surveyed FCC educators in the region participated in one or more supports in the past 2 years.

Landscape Strengths

"There are a few, but of good quality..." ~FCC Educator



- The availability of resources
- Increasing attention on FCCs
- Strong organic networks
- An existing early childhood education ecosystem

Landscape Gaps

"This is an often overlooked group." ~FCC Educator

- Agencies lack strategies to engage with FCCs.
- Available resources are not fully accessible to FCCs. FCCs are chronically under-represented.
 - The ecosystem specifically for FCCs is not well coordinated.
 - Many resources available are not tailored for FCCs
 - Spanish and Vietnamese resources are especially lacking

Educator Interests

94% of surveyed FCC educators are interested in utilizing more educator supports in the future.

There is interest in more child development training, financial assistance (e.g., grants/scholarships), quality improvement programs & ECE accreditation.



- Top training topics include managing natural disasters & heat and managing your business finances.
- Top NAFCC Policy Priorities for educators are:
 - Increased overall funding for early childcare & education
 - Strengthened food program
 - Ensuring sustainable home child care businesses

Recommendations

- Help organizations with existing resources that are available to FCCs maintain momentum in making resources more accessible (e.g., language, times offered, eligibility regs) and creating more connection opportunities for FCCs educators.
- Organize the FCC network and leaders and ensure FCC representation in the early childhood education community.
- Invest in a local program manager, a directory of services & resources available to FCCs, advocacy capacity building & leadership development, paid FCC educators as peer and community advisors, more accreditation, quality, and professional development for FCCs, and dedicated FCC events.


About the Project

In 2024, the National Association for Family Child Care (NAFCC) received a grant from the Powell Foundation to explore opportunities to serve home-based family child care (FCC) educators in Harris County. They partnered with Channel Change to understand:

- 1. What supports are available to FCC educators in Harris County?
- 2. What are the strengths of the existing landscape of support?
- 3. What are the gaps and additional support needed?
- 4. What common support do FCC educators in Harris County seek?
- 5. How might NAFCC support FCC educators in the region?

To answer these questions, the project engaged agencies in the early childhood education sector and FCC educators in Harris County through the following activities:

- Conducting a Landscape Scan by conducting desk research, meeting with agencies in the early
 childhood education sector, and creating a list of educator supports available to FCC educators in
 Harris County.
- Organizing Community Advisors to steer project activities and provide deeper insights into the specific experiences of FCC educators in Harris County.
- Fielding an Educator Survey to hear from a broader community of FCC educators about their experiences with and desires for support.
- Hosting a Project Workshop to gain perspective from FCC educators attending the Houston Regional Conference on the survey results.
- Reporting to Project Participants to share information gained from the project activity with
 participants and offer opportunities for feedback of the findings through an Agency Virtual
 Meetup and Educator Feedback Form.



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About the Participants

Early Childhood Education Agencies (ECE Agencies)

For the Landscape Scan, the project team consulted with 11 agencies in the early childhood education ecosystem in Harris County and 1 in Travis County were interviewed. Most interviews were conducted in September to December 2024 and were 45 minutes to 1 hour. One agency was consulted via a site visit. One agency was interviewed in April 2025. The interview guide for agency interviews is available in Appendix A: Agency Interview Guide.

Community Advisors

From November to December 2024, NAFCC sought nominees for Community Advisors to collaborate with the project team. Calls for nominations were distributed via partner agencies, NAFCC email and social media channels, curated FCC educator email lists, and distribution of fliers at a community meeting. Twenty-five nominations were submitted via the nominations form and two were submitted by a partner agency. Nominees were verified as FCC educators in Harris County and selected by a committee with representation from NAFCC leadership and FCC leaders working with NAFCC. Five FCC educators were invited to serve as Community Advisors. The group included FCC educators from different geographic areas, race and ethnic groups, language preferences, and experiences as FCCs across Harris County. Selected Community Advisors were offered a free NAFCC annual membership, complimentary entry to educator events, and \$500 for 5 hours of engagement and attending the NAFCC professional development conference in March. Family Child Care Educators Surveyed (FCC Educators)

From January to March 2025, NAFCC invited FCC educators in Harris County to participate in a survey on educator supports in Harris County in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Chinese. Educators were invited via emails, social media, and communications to partner agencies. Thirty-four verified FCC educators in Harris County completed the survey. 


Insights & Perspectives: Perspectives on the landscape of support for FCC educators

What supports are available to FCC educators in Harris County?

Landscape of Supports from Landscape Scan


Through the Landscape Scan, we identified forty-two programs offering capacity building support to FCC educators in Harris County. The types of support are distributed across all categories. About half of the programs offer education quality and/or business management training. Over 80% of programs are open for enrollment and over 60% are free to educators.



Current Participation in Educator Supports

In the Educator Survey, 88% of FCC educators said that they participated in one or more educator supports in the past 2 years. 68% participated in Texas Rising Star the last 2 years. 60% hold a higher education certificate or college degree in early childhood education.

What are the strengths of the existing landscape of support?

ECE Agency Perspectives

Interviewed agencies identified 4 key strengths in the landscape of support for FCC educators.

FCC Educator Perspectives

Several respondents independently complimented the quality of educator support when asked, "What feedback do you have on the existing supports in Harris County for home-based family child care educators?"

Surveyed Educator Sentiments on Current Landscape




What are the gaps and additional support needed?

ECE Agency Perspectives

Interviewed agencies observed 5 major challenges in the landscape of support for FCC educators in Harris County. Themes related to each challenge emerged from their comments.

ECE Agency Sentiments on Current Landscape - Gaps from Landscape Scan



Gap 1: Agencies desire more engagement with FCCs, but lack tangible strategies.

Agencies report that they could deepen engagement or more directly serve FCCs, but are limited because of:

- Beliefs that there is not a strong enough business case or benefits for FCCs to engage with their program;
- Recognition there is more outreach to be done;
- Struggles with sparking an educator identity from the beginning;
- Programs that may not match what FCC educators need at the moment; and
- Feelings that programs may be too intrusive or intimidating for FCCs educators.



One clearly identified area where there is strong FCC engagement is in organic networks. However, there is respect that these are guarded and protected spaces for educators, and recognition that capacity building organizations cannot (and potentially) should not be in those spaces.

Gap 2: Available resources are not fully accessible to FCCs.

This is because available resources have eligibility requirements that many FCCs cannot meet.

- Require registration and licensing or participation in a state program
- Some available resources charge fees, tuition or memberships that FCC educators cannot afford.

Also, available resources often do not have capacity to serve additional FCCs.

- FCCs have more variables that make it difficult for capacity building organizations to serve compared to center based child care.
- Capacity building organizations have uncertain funding limiting how long and how many educators they can serve.

Unfortunately, this means the landscape of available resources is difficult to navigate, and there is limited organizational capacity to meaningfully engage FCCs at the level needed.

- There is not a single place where FCCs can find all available resources for FCCs in the Houston area
- It is difficult for FCC educators and capacity building organizations to keep up with what's available.

Gap 3: FCCs are chronically under-represented.

Representation of FCC educators is challenging because:

- It puts a burden on educators.
- Many are not documented and therefore, not visible.

FCC representation would be helpful in:

- Policy meetings for suggestions to the state regulators
- Legislative advocacy (letter writing, meetings)
- Early Childhood Initiative activities coordinated by Harris County
- Connected with early childhood policy organizations
- The Texas Child Care directory
- The Greater Houston Disaster Alliance

Alternative ways to represent FCCs include:

- Creating a larger frame of reference to guide child care rules and regulation development.
- Having a contact person or group to be a point person or representative for FCCs.

Gap 4: The ecosystem for FCCs is not well coordinated.

Agencies are often siloed and competitive, rather than collaborative.

- Support resources in the region are not aligned.
- Not able to serve as many FCC educators as possible.

There is not enough uniformity and language, and it is not easy for FCC educators to come in and engage or network.



Gap 5: Many resources available for child care are not tailored for FCCs.

Child care resources (both educational quality and business resources) are designed more for center based child care.


- Centers are larger and more prominent.
- Regulators aren't used to considering FCCs in regulations and programs.

There are also policy barriers that make it difficult or impossible to formalize home-based child care.

- Some policies are intentional to keep home child care out of communities.
- Others are unintentional oversights.

FCC Educator Perspectives

FCC educators are aware of the gaps in support for their sector. When asked for open feedback on educator supports in Harris County, several note how FCC educators are underserved.

FCC educators that prefer languages other than English are particularly underserved. Approximately 25% of the survey respondents prefer Spanish or Vietnamese languages. Approximately half of the educators that prefer another language said there is not enough educator support available in their preferred language. This is particularly notable among the 2 Vietnamese speaking educators neither felt there is enough educator support available in Vietnamese.



Direction & Opportunities: What common support do FCC

Interest in Educator Supports

According to FCC educators in the survey, nearly all are somewhat or very interested in utilizing educator supports in the future. The most popular are child development training, grants or scholarships, early childhood education improvement programs and early childhood education accreditation.





Additionally, 85% of FCC educations report that they would be interested in future opportunities to participate in Texas Rising Star and higher education in early childhood education.

Teacher prep, writing and simplifying lessons plans, and career pathways were mentioned as helpful training and professional development topics. More free training was also a mentioned request.

Interest In Topics & NAFCC Policy Priorities


Surveyed FCC educators are most interested in supports related to maintaining a home child care service. In terms of topics, support in managing natural disasters and extreme heat, purchasing supplies and equipment, managing business finances and applying and complying with licensing and regulatory standards. Interest in NAFCC Public Policy Priorities are highest for resources that help address the topical areas with increased overall funding for early care and education, strengthened food program, and ensuring sustainable home child care businesses. 
Better access to financial assistance or lower costs for operating a home-based child care business was the most mentioned area of support that would be helpful to FCC educators in the survey.



One interesting idea related to applying and complying with licensing and regulatory standards was a request to better understand rights FCC educators have when licensing representatives come into their home. The educator suggested, "It would be great if there were more training specific to this group, especially regarding licensing and the rights [licensing representatives] have as they come into people's personal homes and bedrooms."

Other Areas of Interest

While requests for more training and financial assistance were more commonly identified among the FCC educators surveyed, several additional opportunities for additional support were mentioned.



Emerging FCC Educator Segments & Outreach Advice

The Community Advisor meetings and the Project Workshop held on March 29 at the Inaugural NAFCC Regional Conference in Houston yielded some interesting insights into the support different FCC educators sought. Observations of the conversations between educators and the questions they asked of



NAFCC and other educators suggest there may be two different segments of educators seeking different types of support.

Emerging FCC Educator Segments Observations from the Project Workshop & Community Advisor Meetings

Systems Savvy

FCC educators in the Systems Savvy segment have extensive knowledge of the local early education ecosystem and are likely licensed and positively rated in Texas Rising Star. They solidly identify as an educator and can talk to common challenges FCCs face from governmental and home owners association policies and in business. They are more likely looking to be seeking more networking and public policy engagement and often serve formally or informally as peer advisors.

Example: An educator started her own FCC after years of experience in early education - including a university degree and work experience in the Texas education system. She is interested in learning more about policy change and seeks more training as part of her professional development accreditation.

Realizing Resources

FCC educators in the Realizing Resources segment may be new to the field or have experience as educators in another country. They may view themselves as "babysitters" but actively practice child development educator skills. They are more likely to serve immigrant families or families who prefer child care in a language other than English. These educators may be interested in learning about existing resources, especially discounts or benefits available to educators, and advise on how to better support and enrich the children in their care.

Example: An FCC educator started with caring for grandchildren and evolved her work into a childcare business. She is highly experienced in caring and developing children, but does not realize she's an educator. She wants to know how she can better care for a child on the autism spectrum and talk with parents about child enrichment.

Community Advisers were also quite insightful on advice for outreach to FCC educators over the course of the project. Recommendations include:

- Offering meaningful compensation for engagement as an incentive.
- Supporting the development of local, grassroots associations.
- Communicating through channels such as mail and in person events in addition to email.
- Messaging to reach those who do not self-identify as "educators."

Recommendations: How might NAFCC support FCC educators in Harris County?

Strategic Opportunities²

To help enhance the system of support in Harris County so that FCCs have more access to training and financial assistance, NAFCC could help organizations with existing resources that are available to FCCs maintain momentum in offering the resources and create more opportunities and connections for FCCs educators. With FCC educators, NAFCC could organize the network and leaders and ensure FCCs are well represented in the early childhood education community.

Offer strategies for increasing engagement between FCCs and capacity building orgs. to further pathways to business & personal prosperity.

- Collaborate on communication and outreach to FCCs
- Offer navigation support to FCCs (esp. Resource Reachers)
- Encourage more training & financial assistance for priority topics

Increase representation of FCCs to inspire advocacy & influence policy for scaled impact.

- Invest in organizing a FCC network & leaders that are available for program consultation & policy advocacy
- Serve as a "go to" resource on FCCs with a dedicated liaison for the region
- Lean in on top FCC policy priorities

Work with capacity building orgs. to improve the accessibility of resources that elevate quality in FCC.

- Partner with agencies to create more accessible eligibility requirements & increase capacity to serve FCCs in accreditation, quality & professional development support.
- Encourage more translation of FCC resources into Spanish & Vietnamese

Coordinate the local FCC ecosystem to maintain momentum of FCCs in regional early childhood educations initiatives.

- Foster coordination and collaboration for service delivery and fundraising for FCC supports
- Host events and partner meetings to highlight available resources and network with FCCs
- Participate in local ECE initiatives

More resources available for child care are tailored to FCCs

Implementation Opportunities

To successfully implement the strategies to address gaps in the landscape of support for FCC educators, NAFCC should consider investing in:

- A **local program manager** to serve as a liaison between FCCs and the early childhood education ecosystem and organize a starting network of FCC educators and leaders;
- Maintaining a directory of services and resources available to FCCs as a resource navigation tool;
- Supporting advocacy capacity building & leadership development, such as starting and
 expanding local or grassroots associations so that FCC educator networks can expand across
 geographic locations and communities with different language preferences;
- A network of paid FCC educators (current and former) that can lend their expertise to the sector by serving as peer advisors to other FCC educators or community advisors to help tailor programs and policies in the region for FCCs;
- Local partnerships to deliver more accreditation, quality, and professional development for FCCs;; and
- Continuing dedicated FCC events to foster a community of FCC educators and supporting organizations in the region.

By building on the strong presence of FCC educators in Harris County and network of early childhood education resources, NAFCC can collaboratively enhance the landscape of supports in the region.



NAFCC in Travis County

With support from the Powell Foundation, NAFCC is also working in Travis County to expand support for FCC educators in the Austin area. This included engaging with a strong early childhood education coalition and a celebration of educators.

Conversation with with the Austin/Travis County Success By 6 Coalition In October 2024, NAFCC and Channel Change met with a representative of the Austin/Travis County Success By 6 Coalition (SX6) to learn about the landscape of supports for FCC educators in Travis County. The SX6 Coalition's long-term goal is "to ensure – at the end of each child's first

Coalition's long-term goal is "to ensure – at the end of each child's first 2,000-day journey – that they are happy, healthy, and ready to succeed in school and in life." They employ different strategies to engage parents, early

childhood service providers, policymakers, philanthropists, business owners in their mission.

The SX6 Coalition has a family-based child care workgroup that builds partnerships with organizations and providers in the region to support FCCs with professional development, business support, etc. For example, they hosted a marketing workshop with a local partner, Economic Growth Business Incubator (EGBI), called the Family Based Child Care Bootcamp. The workgroup and Coalisition in general also engage FCC educators in policy advocacy that support FCC educators and child care.

To expand support for FCC educators in the region, the SX6 coalition is advocating for programs that would offer a Shared Service Alliance to FCCs, raise funds to continue the professional development and business support and individualized coaching for free, and grants to seed more early childcare providers.

Celebration of Family Child Care Educators

On February 1, 2025, NAFCC hosted an evening to celebrate FCC educators in Austin at the Holy Cross Family Life Center. The celebration brought together 75 attendees including:

- 25 FCC educator honorees;
- Dr. Libby Doggett, former Deputy Assistant Secretary for Policy and Early Learning at the U.S. Department of Education:
- Vanessa Fuentes, Austin Mayor Pro Temp; and
- Local State Representatives.

Advocating for Affordable Child Care

Throughout 2024, NAFCC testified and campaigned to make child care more affordable in Travis County. In November, 60% of voters approved Proposition A, a 2.5-cent property tax hike that will create 1,900 childcare slots for babies and toddlers of low-income households, along with 3,900 slots for afterschool and summer school activities for elementary-age students. The measure was supported by nearly 60% of voters and is expected to generate \$75 million for child care in Travis County within one year of implementation.

Sharing Solutions to Address the Child Care Crisis

In August 2024, Tamitha Blackmon, the NAFCC Representative for San Antonio, Houston, and Austin participated in the "Child Care Crisis" panel at the Texas Tribune Festival. Ms. Blackmon spoke to the need for more funding and diverse income options for child care providers. The panel also included State Representative Armando Walle who talked about the need for child care reform. In April 2025, the <u>Texas House passed HB 500, securing \$100 million for child care scholarships</u>.
